Marla Spivak, "Bee Queen," will speak at UMRA's January luncheon program

Did you know that: Most of the nation's honey comes from the Upper Midwest? The University of Minnesota's bee research and outreach program, operating since 1918, is the only one of its kind in the Upper Midwest? A nationally recognized authority on bees — Marla Spivak—has been teaching and conducting bee research here at the U for more than 18 years?

The first two facts are still little-known, but in 2007, when the news media reported bee colonies collapsing across the U.S., threat-

ening a full third of our food supply, Spivak's research came to the fore. Already well known in "bee circles," Spivak had been at the U's entomology department since 1992. Before then, her extensive experience included researching Africanized honey bees in

Costa Rica for her Ph.D. degree from the University of Kansas. An award-winning researcher and teacher here at Minnesota, in 2009 she was named a Distinguished McKnight Professor, one of the University's highest honors.

In 2010, she was awarded a \$500,000 "genius grant" from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation; she is only the second faculty member in University history to win this award. MacArthur Fellows are selected for their creativity, originality, and potential to make important contributions

to the future. Spivak's contributions are already bearing fruit—in improving honey bee health, breeding, and understanding bee behavior.

The accepted practice of using chemical pesticides to control mites in colonies was problematic. Spivak began breeding bees for genetically influenced behaviors that allowed entire colonies to become disease-resistant through the social interaction of the bees themselves. Her "Minnesota Hygienic" line of bees offers an effective and more

sustainable alternative to pesticides. Spivak makes her work available through extension presentations, publications, and workshops. Based on her research findings, beekeepers across the country are establishing local breeding programs to rejuvenate the bee population overall.



Spivak also leads the University's Bee Lab, which provides research and education to professional and amateur beekeepers. With her MacArthur grant funds, she hopes to establish a one-of-a-kind bee center — a combination research lab, honey production facility, museum, and education center.

Agricultural pesticides, disease, and lack of flowers are still decimating our bees, but because of Marla Spivak, both their future and that of America's food sources look much brighter.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

'Tis the season of tidings of joy and annual reports. Let me embrace the occasion to bring you up to date on one ongoing initiative untaken on behalf of UMRA by the Board and several University committees. For some years now, UMRA has been exploring the desirability of establishing a "retirement center" similar to centers at other universities, such as the University of Southern California and Indiana University.

With input from UMRA, in 2007, the University Senate adopted a Resolution on Retiree Benefits that included a call to "consider the establishment of a University-supported Retirement Center." A committee appointed by the provost reviewed background documents and submitted a report in the spring of 2010. The provost endorsed one of the report's options called "Encore Minnesota," and appointed a graduate research assistant, Jack Lam (summer 2011), to research the organizational structure of retiree centers at numerous academic institutions. Lam collected information from 10 institutions and prepared another report that has been submitted to Vice President Carol Carrier and will be made available to the incoming provost.

Many of the activities summarized in the two reports already occur here in various forms — in UMRA, in the University Retirees Volunteer Center (URVC), in the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI). However, we feel that with central direction these three organizations could better coordinate their activities to enhance the integration of the community of retirees within the University. A significant deficiency revealed by the reports is the lack of central oversight of retirees' interests and the attendant minimal visibility of retirees within the University of Minnesota.

Retirees of the University constitute a resource that, at present, is undervalued and largely unrecognized to the detriment of the University. With the recent appointment of President Kaler and the imminent arrival of a new provost, we feel that the time is ripe to remedy this deficiency. It would be a first step toward the goal of establishing a retirees' center, in line with the "Encore Minnesota" model.

Accordingly, we intend to urge the appointment of an administrator in the provost's office to advocate for, coordinate, and monitor greater involvement of retirees in the University culture, to facilitate connections between University needs and retiree resources, and to promote "Encore Minnesota." For an example, URVC currently provides hundreds of volunteer hours per month of service; however, if more University units were aware of this service and more retirees were aware of the opportunities, this resource could have far greater impact.

We know from the success of UMRA's Professional Development Grants program that many retired faculty and staff continue to be productive scholars and resource persons, but most of this work goes unrecognized. The same is true of teaching. The actions of an advocate in the administration could lend credence and visibility to the contributions of retirees and thereby increase both opportunities and participation. The benefits to the University far outweigh the minimal costs involved.

We believe the measures we plan to recommend, pending further discussion and final approval at the January meeting of the Board, will result, if adopted, in a more vibrant and effective University community.

And on that hopeful note, I wish you all happy new year!
