Breckenridge, W. J. *Reptiles and Amphibians of Minnesota*. Minneapolis: University of Minnesota Press, 1944 (3rd printing, 1970). Wonderful text. “Breck” was the Curator of the James Ford Bell Museum of Natural History.

Brodie, Harold J., *The Bird's Nest Fungi*. Toronto and Buffalo: University of Toronto Press, 1975. Very small, interesting mushrooms.

Brodo, Irwin M., Sylvia Duran Sharnoff, and Stephen Sharnoff. *Lichens of North America*. New Haven: Yale University Press, 2001. Over 800 folio pages; weighs about eight pounds. Encyclopedic work; outstanding.

Burris, Judy and Wayne Richards, *The Life Cycles of Butterflies*. North Adams, MA: Storey Publishing, 2006. A book for children, including most of us. Nice.

Capinera, John L, Ralph D. Scott, and Thomas J. Walker. *Field Guide to Grasshoppers, Katydid, and Crickets of the United States*. Ithaca: Comstock Publishing Associates, a Division of Cornell University Press, 2004. An excellent guide; great illustrations

Carlson, Bruce M. *A North Country Lake Throughout the Seasons*. Golden Valley, MN: Woodtick Press, LLC, 2023. Accompanied by video files that are purchased separately.

Case, Frederick W., Jr., *Orchids of the Western Great Lakes Region*, revised edition. Bloomfield Hills, Michigan: Cranbrook Institute of Science, 1987.

Coffin, Barbara and Lee Pfannmuller, editors. *Minnesota's Endangered Flora and Fauna*. Minneapolis: University of Minnesota Press, 1988. A labor of many of Minnesota's most dedicated naturalists; an essential book relating to conservation.

Coffman, John Henry, *How to know the Butterflies: A Manual of the Butterflies of Eastern United States*. New York: D. Appleton, 1904.

Collins, James P. and Martha L. Crump, *Extinction in Our Time: Global Amphibian Decline*. New York: Oxford University Press, 2009. Study of frogs.

Douglas, Matthew M., *The Lives of Butterflies*. Ann Arbor: University of Michigan Press, 1984.

Dowden, Anne Ophelia, *Wild Green Things in the City: A Book of Weeds*. New York: Thomas Y. Crowell Company, 1972. The same author has written books on flowers and trees, beautifully written and illustrated by the author's paintings. Great books!

Du Bois, Bob and Mike Reese (photographer), *Damselflies of the North Woods: A field guide to all 46 northern damsels*. Duluth: Kollath-Stensaas Publishing, 2005. Another outstanding title in the North Woods Naturalist Series.

Eaton, Eric R. and Kenn Kaufman, *Field Guide to the Insects of North America*. New York: Houghton Mifflin Company, 2007.

Eifert, Virginia. *Birds in Your Back Yard*. Springfield, Illinois: Printed by the authority of the State of Illinois, 1945. First edition, 1941. A fascinating book, with fine illustrations by the author.

Eisner, Thomas, *For Love of Insects*. Cambridge, Massachusetts: Belknap Press of Harvard University, 2003. A beautiful book with a very helpful text.

Elliott, Lang and Wil Hershberger. *The Songs of Insects*. Boston: Houghton Mifflin Company, 2007. Outstanding photographs and text; CD of the songs.

Foelix, Rainer F. *Biology of Spiders*. Oxford: Oxford University Press, 2011. The third edition of a textbook originally published in 1979, revised and updated by the author. The book has wonderful drawings and photographs, footnotes, an extensive bibliography and an index. It is a fine textbook on spiders and their lives.

Glassberg, Jeffrey, *Butterflies of North America*. New York: Sterling Publishing Company, 2002. Book by a butterfly expert.

Gunderson, Harvey L. and James R. Beer, *The Mammals of Minnesota*. Minneapolis: University of Minnesota Press, 1953. Classic work.

Hahn, Jeff, *Insects of the North Woods. A handy field guide to 444 of our most distinctive and interesting insects*. Duluth: Kollath+Stensaas Publishing, 2009. North Woods Naturalist Series.

Hanson, Thor. *Feathers: The Evolution of a Natural Miracle*. New York: Basic Books, 2011. Well-written, fascinating.

Haupt, Lyanda Lynn Haupt, *Crow Planet: Essential Wisdom from the Urban Wilderness*. New York: Little Brown and Company, 2009. Interesting study.

Hazard, Evan B., *The Mammals of Minnesota*. Minneapolis: University of Minnesota Press, 1982. Classic book.

Minneapolis: Voyageur Press, 2008. A fine book with wonderful photos on a great subject. The author has also written an excellent book on the eggs of birds.

Herberstein, Marie Elisabeth. *Spider Behaviour: Flexibility and Versatility*. Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2011. A hefty book of nearly 400 pages by fifteen spider experts from all over the world. Not an easy read but good.

Himmelman, John. *Discovering Moths: Nighttime Jewels in Your Own Backyard*.

Camden, Maine: Down East Publishers, 2002. A good “how to do it” book.

Howell, W. Mike and Ronald J. Jenkins. *Spiders of the Eastern United States: A Photographic Guide*. Boston, MA: Pearson Education, Inc., 2004. A fine guidebook with outstanding photographs.

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Karns, Michael, Dennis Becker and Lisa Golden Schroeder, *Untamed Mushrooms: From Field to Table. A Midwestern Guide*. St. Paul: Minnesota Historical Society Press, 2018. Folio size with absolutely glorious photographs. Recipes. Even if you would never consider eating a wild mushroom, this is a fantastic book.

Kaston, B.J. and Elizabeth Kaston. *How to Know the Spiders*. Dubuque, IA: Wm. C.

Brown Company, 1953. An old, good standard. Authors write: “Familiarity with spiders

dispels the almost universal fear with which they are regarded, and in a world full of fears, we can very well do with one less.” p. iv.

King, Scott, *Flower Flies of Minnesota*. Minnetonka, MN: Pollination Press LLC, 2021.

Also known as hover flies. Little-known group of insects mostly overlooked. Easy to see near you.

Kroodsma, Donald. *The Singing Life of Birds: The Art and Science of Listening to Birdsong*. Boston: Houghton Mifflin Company, 2005. The songs of birds are receiving special attention. This a pioneering work in this field. Includes a CD.

Kuo, Michael and Andrew S. Methven, *Mushrooms of the Midwest*. Urbana: University of Illinois Press, 2014. A heavy folio book, with many, many photographs. A great reference work.

Macy, Ralph W. and Harold H. Shepard. *Butterflies: A Handbook of the Butterflies of the United States, Complete for the Region North of the Potomac and Ohio Rivers and East of the Dakotas*. Minneapolis: University of Minnesota Press, 1941. A classic. Great book.

Marrone, Teresa and Kathy Yerich, *Mushrooms of the Upper Midwest*. Cambridge, MN: Adventure Publications, 2014. Excellent, pocket size.

Mollen, Cora and Larry Weber, *Fascinating Fungi of the North Woods*. Duluth: Kollath +Stensaas Publishing, 2007. North Woods Naturalist Series. A great book with wonderful hand-painted illustrations.

Moriarty, John J., and Siah L. St. Clair (photographer), *A Field Guide to the Natural World of the Twin Cities*. Minneapolis: University of Minnesota Press, 2018. A perfect companion for the nature observer in this area. Photos are splendid; text is excellent, concise and informative. Great book. Also in paperback.

Young, Jon. *What the Robin Knows: How Birds Reveal the Secrets of the Natural World*.

Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 2012 (Mariner Paperback edition, 2013.) A very interesting

backyard study that refers to files of audio recordings of bird songs. A site for the audio

files is provided for them but I couldn't make it work.
